MEDIA CHALLENGE

The Media Challenge (TMC) an annual outreach event organised by Republic Polytechnic's School of Management and Communication engaged secondary school students interested in mass communication. In TMC 2017, students were tasked to come up with a news package comprising an article with captioned photos and a short video, and to promote their news package on various social media platforms.

We spent an extremely long time mulling over what our campaign idea should be, ultimately deciding to focus on a topic that most youth today are familiar with, and one that most in our group have had personal experiences with - bullying. Our take on the issue was that while bullying is wrong, we believe that bullies should be given a second chance.

It proved to be a challenge when we went out on the streets to hear people's stories and thoughts (a critical component of the challenge) - roughly half of the people we spoke to failed to be entirely convinced by our campaign. It was definitely a setback, but we took it in our stride and focused on those who were in agreement, many of whom also shared with us personal stories that moved us deeply and made the countless rejections and numerous so-called "failures" worthwhile.

One of the fondest memories we have is working long hours to get everything done, sacrificing sleep in the process. While it was definitely tiring we are grateful to have gone through this together and surviving on 1 hour of sleep. Winning the competition was merely a bonus to everything else we learned and experienced.

GETTING TO KNOW YOU @ MAKERSPACE

- Ms Gayle Rosen speaks to Mr Wayne Wang

Wayne Wang is our MakerSpace Master Technician and is an extraordinarily skilled craftsman, mentor and wonderful example for students and staff of humility and kindness. I call him, Mr. Wonderful.

- Q. How long have you been working in the NYGH MakerSpace?
- A. About one and a half years.
- Q. What is your professional background?
- A. I was a ship builder. I have built large commercial ships, Navy ships and Minesweepers. Minesweepers are sixty meter fibreglass ships that are created with completely different technology than traditional ships.
- Q. In addition to mentoring students in the MakerSpace, you have been a great resource for the school. It was really amazing that you crafted five hundred and fifty flower pots for this year's Seed to Shoot Open House Competition! What other NYGH projects have you worked on?
- A. I have enjoyed producing several projects for the new Studio Theatre including custom hooks to hang heavy cables, the theatre seating and just finished welding together a large steel wardrobe for hanging costumes. For the upcoming 100 Year Gala, I will be making props such as a gate that will resemble the original Nanyang gate. I am excited about this because I am collaborating with the Aesthetics department.
- Q. What do you find most fun about working in the NYGH MakerSpace?
- A. When I am working I am also learning, especially from the students. The students here have great initiative and are very proactive.
- Q. You are incredibly skilled, what don't you know that you wish you knew how to do?
- A. I would like to improve my skills and work with stainless steel, which looks nice and lasts long but does require different skills than I have now. I would also like to learn the new technologies like laser cutting, 3D printing and cutting with a CNC router.



Our Parent Support Group also contributed by setting up stalls at our Open House.








EXCEL FEST 2017 @ SUNTEC

The MakerSpace@NYGH encourages every Nanyang Girl to "Connect the Head to the Hand to the Heart", that is to execute their brilliant ideas with the crafting skills that they have, giving it personal or community meaning. I do hope that through sharing this during the MOE Excel Fest, we have inspired many educators to start out their own MakerSpace in their respective schools!



INFOCOMM MEDIA DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY (IMDA) LAB ON WHEELS





The Lab on Wheels from Infocomm Media Development Authority (IMDA) was at NYGH from 6th March to 9th March. These were two buses equipped with technologies aimed at igniting the young's passion for technology through engaging and experiential activities. Students had the opportunity to try and experiment various cool new tech exhibits on board, such as virtual reality, augmented reality, robotics, electronics and 3D printing. Students also had opportunities to attend hands-on workshops. The workshops were Spheros, drones, Kodu, and 3D design and modelling.

Students reported that the workshops were fun and engaging. They were keen to learn more about technology, and had increased interest in computer science.

Lab on Wheels was such a new experience for me. I have never been on a bus that was that interactive. There were different stations where we could play with the machines and see how they worked. I had fun experimenting with all of them, especially the small robot that could play games with me, the screen that watered sunflowers according to where I looked and the virtual reality games where I could draw whatever I wanted. It made technology less intimidating, which I appreciated. I was surprised to find myself actually being interested in how engineers made them, like what kind of screen is used to make 2D things appear so convincingly 3D; I was so intrigued.

What caught my attention the most was the 3D printer. It is controlled by a smartphone, which is used to draw and design the shape of the desired object which is subsequently sent to the 3D printer for printing. Initially, I thought 3D printing was merely used for designing objects for decorative purposes, but a guide told me 3D printing could also be used for medical purposes, such as for prosthetic limbs for patients, and models for surgeons to plan and practise their surgical procedures. This made me ponder deeply about the true purpose of technology, and how it can be used to save lives, and change the world.

At the start of the year, NYGH Green Club was invited by National Parks Board (NParks) to participate in the opening of the Learning Forest of Singapore Botanic Gardens. The site was opened by Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong on March 31 2017, and Green Club was extremely honoured to be serving as station guides and involved as tree planters. It was undoubtedly a fruitful experience and rare opportunity for us.

As station guides, we trained for a month with NParks to prepare the presentation for the Prime Minister and guests at the opening. We were allocated three different stations, namely the Wetlands Overhead Boardwalk, the Botanists' Boardwalk and the boardwalk at Pulai Marsh. The first station introduced EJH Corner, the first director of the Singapore Botanic Gardens who discovered that vegetation belts along the riverside could be classified into eight belts, five of which can be found at the Keppel Discovery Wetlands.

The Learning Forest of Singapore Botanic Gardens is truly a beautiful place, flourishing with flora and fauna. We encourage everyone to visit the Learning Forest and learn more about the biodiversity in Singapore and the importance of conserving the freshwater swamp habitat.

URA URBAN PLANNING FESTIVAL 2017

On the 22 March 2017, 6 groups of thirty Secondary Two students from Nanyang Girls' High School were at the URA Urban Planning Festival 2017, specially curated for Secondary and Pre-university students to excite them about urban planning. A range of activities, from exhibitions and workshops to talks and tours enriched students' knowledge and provided a platform for youths to showcase their vision of future Singapore. Of the eighty groups at the Exposition last year, URA selected 6 to exhibit at this year's Urban Planning Festival.

Our Secondary One Interdisciplinary Studies 2016 students were tasked to redesign their school for 2036 and to feature a sustainable living space that combined the basic needs of food and shelter. Design Thinking was used to help students empathise with the people they were designing for, define their needs and ideate an innovative solution and finally create and test the feasibility of their creation. With the consideration of constraint of space in Singapore, our students thought of ways to use available space more productively, incorporating gardens that yielded vegetables. Their projects demonstrated sustainability while mindful of the school environment, culture, heritage and the local neighbourhood.
